Objective 2:

All families of children with special health care needs will have adequate private and/or public insurance to pay for the services they need

Project Goals

- To improve systems of care for children with special health care needs and their families
- To help families make active choices about employment and benefits
- To help employers develop and utilize benefits to increase workplace participation and performance

Main Questions

- how current benefit structures help families with children with special health care needs
- how employers/purchasers currently view the needs of families caring for CSHCN
- how employers/purchasers view opportunities for improvement.

Tales of Children with Special Health Care Needs

- Sam, 10yo with Attention-Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder; needs special after-school program; aggressive behavior with peers sometimes gets him in trouble
- Takitha, 3yo with spina bifida; had 3 surgical procedures in first year of life; now happy, in daycare; plans for another orthopedic operation in six weeks

Further Tales

- Justin, 9yo with moderate to severe asthma; did well over the summer, but late fall and early winter are his hard times. In hospital twice last year. Uses inhaler; nurse at school once a week.
- Sandra, 14yo with depression; some illegal drug use. Never hospitalized, but has had school absences last few weeks.

Phase I: Findings

- Limited understanding of benefits managers of CSHCN
- Tendency to focus on children with very severe conditions and costly needs
- Variations among industries in benefit interest, based mainly on type of employee (skilled, technical vs. other)
- Limited organization of employees to seek improved benefits
