Compassion: Two reasons we take it for granted

- 1. We are all compassionate
- 2. We commodify Medical Home
 - Accessible if...ramps & elevators
 - Coordinated if...professional CC
 - Family-centered if...FAC in place
 - Culturally effective if...alguien habla español

AAHP definition

... comprehensive, specialized care provided by an interdisciplinary team to patients and families living with a life-threatening or severe advanced illness expected to progress toward dying and where care is particularly focused on alleviating suffering and promoting quality of life.

American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine

AAP Recommendations

- provide support and anticipatory guidance for children and families who face death
- •encourage open discussion of reactions, thoughts, and feelings in the family ... increasing the sense of mutual support and cohesion
- positive outcomes associated with:
 - age-appropriate and culturally sensitive guidance
 - ability to share
 - reliance on family members
 - good communication

Palliative Care in the Medical Home

- combines palliative and life-prolonging care
- part of the general philosophy of care, not a separate part or place
- concern for child/youth and family is demonstrated in verbal and nonverbal interactions
- efforts made to understand and empathize with the feelings and perspectives of the family as well as the child or youth


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


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Explicit recognition that the work has an element of emotional labor

- Making hard choices together*


